- Application for a Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN). A TIN is *not* a number but a category of numbers the IRS uses to identify individuals or organizations:
 - Social Security Number (SSN)
 - Employer Identification Number (EIN) {Having an EIN *does not* mean an organization is tax-exempt. However, your organization needs an EIN to apply for 501(c)(3) status.}
 - Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN)
 - Taxpayer Identification Number for Pending U.S. Adoptions (ATIN)
 - Preparer Taxpayer Identification Number (PTIN)
- Application for 501(c)(3) tax exemption
- Annual Filing of the Form 990, required for all nonprofit organizations with tax exempt status
